BI 801 Seminar in Biblical Studies (The Epistle to the Romans) (GVL&Online) Saturdays: 9:00am-5:00pm; 1/20, 2/17, 3/16, 4/13; in-person and live video conference for distance students

This seminar examines advanced interpretive, background, and theological topics in Romans. Special attention is given to the theological ideas of Romans in relation to the whole of Pauline thought. Students analyze scholarly discussions of Pauline theology, issue of Paul and the law, and write academic papers on exegetical and theological issues in Romans.

This course will examine the historical background and theological accomplishments of the Westminster Assembly in the seventeenth century. Students may concentrate their research in either the biblical, historical, or theological aspects of the standards produced by this Assembly that have been of such enduring significance for subsequent church history.
