BI 801 (DW & Online) Sem. In Biblical Studies (Revelation)

This course will examine both the apocalyptic and the non-apocalyptic nature of the book of Revelation and focus on its first-century historical context. Emphasis will be placed on how in many ways Revelation is a creative fulfillment of the dominant themes of both the Old and the New Testaments.

Special attention is given to the relationship of Christology to the doctrine of God and current debates on the formation of early Christian belief on Jesus' divinity.

Emphasis will be placed on examining particular texts in one book with corresponding passages (thematically related) in the other. The format includes lectures, classroom discussion, and exegesis of selected texts.

TH 800 (Online) Becoming a Christian Scholar
Full Semester: Required for 1st Year ThM students; asynchronous, with several live video conference discussion sessions required
