BI 801(G'ville & Online) Sem. in Biblical Studies: Galatians through Thessalonians, Philemon

This course examines advanced introductory, exegetical, and theological topics in Galatians through Thessalonians, as well as Philemon. Special attention is given to scholarly discussions on the nature of Pauline theology and the composition of these letters. Students analyze and synthesize course material by writing academic papers on exegetical and theological issues in this corpus.



## BI 802 (DW & Online) Sem. in OT Backgrounds & Theology

This course examines current academic issues in the Old Testament, including the relationship between the Old Testament and science/archeology, whether the Old Testament has a unifying center, and how the New Testament uses the Old. The purpose of the course is to orient the student to the central issues in contemporary Old Testament studies.

It will examine efforts by others and will seek to construct a personal understanding of theodicy that is intellectually adequate and pastorally helpful.
