ST 801 (Gville & Online) Seminar in Theological Studies: Union with Christ

Saturdays: 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m; 5/31, 6/21, 7/12, 8/2; in-person and live video conference for distance students

This course provides an advanced theological, historical, and biblical-theology study of the doctrine of union with Christ. Special attention is given to scholarly study of a Reformed *ordo salutis*; the significance of the doctrine of union in Calvin and Reformed theology, modern Pauline studies, and ecclesiology; and the biblical basis for this doctrine. Students identify and analyze key issues in the ongoing study of union with Christ.

BI 801 (Online) Seminar in Biblical Studies: The Minor Prophets

This course uses a study of the history, content, milieu, text, structure, and theological meaning of each book of the Minor Prophets to illustrate current academic issues in the Old Testament. These include the redactional history of the Book of the Twelve, and how to read them as a single work. Detailed attention is given to ethical and doctrinal themes within each book.

BI 801 (DW & Online) Seminar in Biblical Studies: The Sermon on the Mount

Students will examine the Sermon on the Mount with particular attention given to some of the key words in the Greek text. Emphasis will be placed on exploring recent literature on the Sermon and uncovering the radical view of Christian discipleship that is found in this body of Jesus' teaching.
